Increased supervision / teaching of hand washing.</p> <p>Social distancing – adults keeping 2m apart as much as possible, reducing staff, parent and children's contact with each other if they don't live together (sub-bubbles keeping 2m from children and adults in a different sub-bubble, Hythe Bay Nursery bubble not mixing with school or other nursery bubbles, visitors wearing PPE if necessary and social distancing), not sitting too close to each other at meal times.</p> <p>Limited access to toys and areas – closing areas which aren't being used, storing away most toys and resources to make it easier to keep a good cleaning schedule.</p> <p>Increased surface and toy washing / sanitising.</p> <p>Risk assess / limit outings – nursery garden and school field only for outdoors, unless risk for outing is assessed as low.</p> <p>Anyone with symptoms / living with someone with symptoms to stay away from nursery in line with gov guidance (10 / 14 days minimum). Anyone advised to shield themselves (have no face to face contact outside their household) or to isolate / quarantine must stay at home, following government and NHS guidance. From next stage: increased number of children in nursery:

Number of children invited to come back is continuously reviewed for everyone's safety.

Children are organised into small groups, to reduce social contact. Each 'sub-bubble' has their own sub-bubble area, where only adults and children from that particular sub-bubble can enter.

In the shared spaces and corridors: 2m social distancing guides are visible in the queue corridor, everyone must stay away from those outside their 'sub-bubble' or household. Shared areas are not to be used by more than one sub-bubble at a time. Handwashing before and after entering shared garden or other shared area. Equipment and toys washed in between use from different sub-bubbles.

Each area has their own set of cleaning products and PPE available for regular cleaning of surfaces and hand cleaning, etc.

The shared toilet and sink area are not to be used together, where possible. Each area's art sink can be used to clean hands. Each sub-bubble has their own labelled toilet and sink to use, to reduce chances of cross contamination. Toilets and sinks areas to be cleaned as often as needed to reduce cross contamination.

Parents are asked to reduce social interactions at nursery; one parent at a time, dropping off and collecting the child from the main nursery door if possible, or to the area's entrance if not.

If a child is unwell, they need to be 2m away from all other adults and children, if possible. If an adult needs to be within 2m of the child, they must wear full PPE, as required by government guidance. The entire area will need to be cleaned, and all children in that area might need to be sent home too, following government guidance and public health regulations at the time.
